Dear Alex and Paulo,

I was so very sorry to hear about Paulo's father's condition deteriorating. My thoughts are with you in these perilous, sad times...

I'm still off e-mail, maybe till tomorrow, but I did download the "Serpent" module and printed it on Joanne's computer – the artwork looks very good and the text, as I have perused it throughout and near the end, is excellent. I'll give you further review soon, but my highest priority is for the Introduction to Volume IIB of Aetherometry, the bounds of which I now understand.

Attached is the listing sheet and much more on this most extraordinary property here in Pembroke, which is less than 0.5 miles from our rented place here at 422 Pembroke Street. It is #471 Pembroke Street – it's on the other side of the street, closer to Concord. The price was dropped in September from \$475k to \$450k! I have just checked with Sherry Stevens: it is still on the market. The agent who is in charge of it for Carlson GMAC, Michelle Collins, was in fact the representative who sold us our present house. However, my contact on this new property (which had interested me as a possible investment, though it is too expensive for that purpose given our situation), is Sherry Stevens. So, if by some chance this really should interest you, let us work through Sherry.

I drove up again its 700-800 ft driveway, which is paved. The house is probably at least 70-100 feet in altitude above the street level. There is a beautiful view toward the southwest from the house and one can see the rolling, still painted hills. The Merrimack River is in the Valley it overlooks. There are open fields there. Complete privacy near the house. "Organon II"? The new barn(s) and sturdy vehicle out building near the house might be excellent lab facilities, but I am sure the house itself would serve for that. Finally, and most amazing, there is a huge old barn down near the street level. It could be rented out to someone for a commercial business of some kind – antiques, or who knows what. Or, it could be rehabilitated in its interior for some other use. (A Museum of New Energy Science – I hereby volunteer to be the "curator" and show the various working aetherometric devices – for which you would charge a hefty entrance fee!) (Or sell the barn to a dismantler for a high price, for someone considering building a high-priced residence based on the barn frame – this is done in many places in New England).

I know it is a very long shot to convince you to choose New Hampshire as your next destination – the Sun and warmer climates have a pull for you, but here are my thoughts as to why you should consider this – or possibly some other property of equivalent good value here in NH:

- New Hampshire is a nice, clean, friendly, and safe place to live – much more pleasant and secure than most other places in the US.

- There is no state income tax and no state sales tax – and likely never will be. The resistance to either is extremely high. Yes, there is a property (real estate) tax.

- Excellent proximity to miles and miles of ocean – not only the NH coast just 45 minutes to one hour away, but also Maine, Rhode Island, and Connecticut.

- This is selfish of me, but I would very much love to have you in close proximity so that we could work together more. I'd be another hand and mind for your work that would be much more effective if your lab were right here. (And, I think that your proximity might eventually lead to a future chance of attracting a supporter for your work, but let us leave that as not a particularly good reason, since you would not "buy" that!)

- There is excellent access to the stupendous library systems of probably the largest concentrations of universities in the world – Boston/New England. Also, the real possibility of making some headway with the establishment by arranging lectures, conferences, and demonstrations in an area that is very accessible – both to US and Canadians, but also from abroad.

- With the savings you might incur with a New Hampshire location, you could periodically "get away" to those sunnier places that draw you.

- This may or may not be of interest to you, but the "Free State" movement – an official movement, has just selected New Hampshire as the state to which at least 5,000 libertarians/anarchists are committing themselves to move to within five years. You can look up their intentions on the web.

If you wish, I could personally explore this property across the street and find out answers to any questions you may have that are not answered by the sheets. Mortgage rates, by the way, are at about 6.5% now, and 20% down (or less) will do.


Let me know what you think.
